#### Funding for psychological professions training programmes

With regard to the eligibility change for those applying for the 2022 Doctorate in Clinical Psychology on 3 September 2021, HEE is now able to extend this eligibility for NHS funding to all entering any of our psychological professions training listed below up to the end of the current financial year (by 31 March 2022) who receive offers from clinical psychology training programmes in 2023 or 2024. This means that there will now be no 'retrospective' application of changes to those who have started or are about to start one of these trainings. <u>Please read the full update on HEE's webpages</u>.

**World Sepsis Day 2021- HEE launches new Sepsis Awareness Resource video** For World Sepsis Day, HEE has released a <u>new animation video</u>, which showcases the available learning resources which have been designed to educate our health and care professionals on Sepsis cases and boost their confidence in responding to them. The animation includes HEE's work with key stakeholders in developing the <u>THINK SEPSIS E-Learning Programme</u> and a wide range of learning materials for primary care, secondary care, and paediatrics, as well as executive, nonexecutive and management level staff, and the public.

#### Call for NHS Ambassadors to inspire young people

Health and care professionals are being asked to sign up as NHS Ambassadors to volunteer their time sharing their experiences of work with young people and inspiring them to pursue a career in health and care. Through the Inspiring the Future initiative, our NHS Ambassadors have interacted with 400,000 young people in the last two years, educating them in the vast range of careers in health and care by sharing their experiences.

# New "Blue Light" mental health and wellbeing resource added to MindEd programme

A new resource to help "Blue Light" colleagues better support each other has been added to HEE's eLearning for healthcare (HEE elfh)'s MindEd programme. Rates of distress and mental disorder in emergency services staff are known to be high. Collectively, "Blue Light" personnel and emergency responders have expressed a wish to be able to support each other better.

In response to this, Blue Light Services Building Staff Psychosocial Resilience and Wellbeing has been developed for professionals across all emergency services including ambulance, police, lifeboats, fire, search and rescue. The resource consists of 4 elearning sessions to help learners identify colleagues who are struggling and offer advice to better support one another and manage early distress.

#### Genomics in your Practice: a health and social care survey

To understand how genomics is being used by medical professionals, and help inform future training and education plans, the Genomics Education Programme (GEP) is seeking views from the medical community.

The online survey, <u>Genomics in your Practice, is now open</u> to all medical professionals working in the UK and will be available until Monday 20 September. It should take around 15 to 25 minutes to complete. Find out <u>more about the survey on our webpage</u>.

#### Finding a genomic cause: the clinician's role

As greater numbers of clinicians refer patients for genomic testing through the NHS Genomic Medicine Service (GMS), the Genomics Education Programme recognises the need for educational resources to support with this transition. The actions taken, and information provided, by referring clinicians is crucial to laboratory scientists as it is used to apply various filtering stages when looking for a diagnosis.

The Genomics Education Programme has developed a new resource: Finding a genomics cause: the clinician's role, to show how laboratory scientists whittle down the genomic variants identified by genomic sequencing to find a diagnosis for patients and show how the actions of the referring clinician impact this process. This new resource breaks down the variant filtering process and has a useful list of FAQs, as well as signposting to other related resources.
