

Get in... Opportunities for people to start their career in a support role

Project Title: Taking Entry Level and Apprenticeship

Opportunities to a wider audience

Timescale: 6-9th March 17 and ongoing

Program being delivered

The intended outcome of the project was to educate the general public (often parents and guardians of young people) in order to attract more young people and improve diversity within the workforce.

It was achieved by taking a careers stand to public places, during National Apprenticeship week, such as shopping centres and supermarkets, as well as the tradition careers (Job Centre Plus, schools and colleges). Health Ambassadors included an Apprentice from the CCG and two Apprentices from Primary Care.

The success was measured by recording how many people integrated with us at which events. We gave careers advice to 180 people during the week and assisted with 12 CVs for older learners.

Continuing the programme reference material was taken away by members of the public included the traditional Career Booklets for NHS roles (by Health Careers) and current entry level job roles. In additional a bank of testimonials were created of local Apprentices, charting the start of their career in the NHS, explained their role and what their next career steps are.

As part of the Health Ambassadors role we have attended 18 careers events as a CCG during April 2016 - March 2017 and spoken to over 850 people of different ages and cultures about the careers in Primary Care and the CCG. We have 14 active HA's on the register.

We are currently approaching local periodicals to get careers in the NHS to a larger audience across the county.

A careers stand was set up for the morning in the entrance to Tesco Extra, to link to their Community Network. In all 38 people talked to us about general opportunities in the NHS ranging from enquiries from employees returning to work after a career break, to young people who are looking for a new career. Enquiries included nursing, dental, business management. information management and HCA careers and pathways into the NHS.



Tuesday 7th March. Huntingdon



A workshop was delivered around Apprenticeship Opportunities and general routes into a variety of roles an the NHS at Job Centre Plus (28 people). Sallyann Woodthorpe was joined by Viv John from CCS as part of Partnership Working. Job seekers were supported to look at their key transferable skills and see how that fits into NHS Value. We finished the afternoon with a CV surgery and general CV advice.

Wednesday 8th March. Hampton

Rebecca Wimbleton (CCS), Sallyann Woodthorpe & Charley -Mae Holt (CCG) held an event at Serpentine Green with enquiries from 54 people, about working in the NHS. We enjoyed meeting Apprentices from Hampton Health Centre and Addenbrookes and hearing about their roles.



Thursday 9th March. Peterborough



A long, but varied day promoting NHS and particularly Primary Care Apprenticeships, starting at Arthur Mellows school at 9am. Nineteen sixth form students (Year 13) enquired about roles in the NHS including Mental Health Nursing, Healthcare Science, IT and Dispensing.

We finished the day at 7pm at Peterborough Regional College where 58 parents, learners and school leavers asked about a variety of careers.
