Get on... Support people to be the best they can be in the job they do

Project Title: Super HCA Programme	Timescale: Cohorts taught September 2015 – July 2016, level 3 completed by September 2018, Programmes being delivered

The intended outcome of the project was to Upskill HCAs, build confidence, and develop further skills. The course offered a networking opportunity to share knowledge with peers and an opportunity to improve policy and procedures in Practice.

Ultimately the programme's intention was to value and retain HCAs in Primary Care, reducing attrition rates and offering clear routes into nursing.

It was achieved by promoting the programme in 105 GP Practices and through, GP Gateway Nurse Forums and Members events and speaking to ANP and HCAs in Practice.

The enrolled HCAs started their learning with the Apprenticeship (Health Care Support Worker – Clinical) Level 2/3, delivered in the workforce and based on vocational learning (delivered by Dynamic Training and West Suffolk College).

Mapped to this was the Professional Skills – RCGP Accredited (Level 4). This was delivered by Annie Barr Associates as three cohorts (Huntingdon / Cambridge / Peterborough) with an update for each cohort six months later. In total the HCAs had 5 days out of Practice. New employees were also trained in the Care Certificate.

The success was measured by recording feedback from learners and what their progression routes were. Out of 21 learners:

- 2 Super HCAs applied for the FdSc at ARU September 2016 intake,
- 4 are waiting to apply 2017

Continuing the programme has become challenging as a result of the Apprenticeship Levy and the changes in funding for training. In addition the Care Certificate element is still being pursued. The first learner has completed the CC in Primary Care and we now have three Assessors and two QAs.
