Nurse Educator Toolkit receives royal college of nursing endorsement

The Genomics Education Programme (GEP) is delighted to announce the <u>Nursing Educator's Toolkit</u> has received endorsement from the Royal College of Nursing (RCN).

The toolkit, developed with representatives from nursing practice, policy and education, was created to help educators embed genomics into their pre-registration teaching. The toolkit is a case study-based resource that aims to demonstrate that genomics can be applied across many different fields and clinical situations within nursing practice.

More than 18,000 students accepted onto nursing and midwifery courses in England

More than 16,000 students have made it on to nursing degree courses in England for 2022-23, according to new data published by UCAS. In addition to this there were 2,790 accepted applicants to midwifery courses.

Nursing degrees are the most employable in the UK, with 94% of graduates getting a job within six months of finishing their course.

National Education and Training survey now live until 30 November

The annual <u>National Education and Training Survey (NETS)</u> is now live. NETS offers universities, colleges, healthcare placement providers and HEE further insight into the quality of the clinical learning environment. The purpose of the survey is to understand the standard of education and training and the experience of students, to improve quality.

The survey is open to all students, doctors, and dentists in training across all health and care services in England.

The NETS is unique and offers a multi-professional window into the environments and services in which the current and future healthcare workforce are training and working and can identify emerging and escalating concerns.

Mental Health

New online eating disorder learning on physical health assessments and monitoring

Eating disorders are common and Anorexia Nervosa has the highest mortality rate of any mental illness. However, people with eating disorders have better recovery rates, and a reduced risk of relapse, when they receive the right support as early as possible.

The physical health risks of eating disorders, physical health assessment and monitoring is a key aspect of care. HEE has worked in partnership with NHS England and the charity Beat to launch <u>online medical monitoring eating disorder learning</u> to support teams involved in this work.

World Suicide Prevention Day and the #ZeroSuicideLDN campaign The #ZeroSuicideLDN campaign aims to encourage Londoners to take up free online suicide prevention training.

Thrive LDN has partnered with the <u>Zero Suicide Alliance</u>, who have created a training program to help people to be able to identify warning signs and to feel comfortable having conversations about suicide.

Now more than 300,000 amazing Londoners have accessed suicide prevention training since the launch of the Zero Suicide LDN campaign by the Mayor of London in 2019. It only takes 20 minutes. But it could make all the difference to someone in need.

Other workforce and education updates

Healthcare career path resources for young people launched

NHS 'Careers Untapped', an initiative funded by the London Widening Participation Programme, has been designed to showcase different NHS clinical and non-clinical careers that students may be unaware of. Over 1000 young people from across the region recently joined a live virtual launch webinar.



We will be running three virtual events in the future for London students and will share further details in future editions. 'NHS Careers Untapped' material is aimed at all young people in London aged between 13 and 18 years old to promote and encourage an interest in healthcare careers in an accessible, equitable and flexible way.

The materials, including videos, podcasts, interactive courses and recorded webinars, have all been developed in collaboration with the project team, whose members include Great Ormond Street Hospital NHS Foundation Trust, University College London Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust and Whittington Health NHS Trust.

HEE funds the Widening Participation programme in the London region, which is part of the national <u>Talent for Care Programme</u>.

Programme for patient leaders – being a bridge across your community

This programme is for patient leaders, to support them to develop their negotiating, advocating, and coaching skills, to be a voice for community engagement and empowerment, and impact on the changes that are happening in health and social care as Integrated Care Systems become established.

The programme consists of four virtual sessions in November, with the aim of supporting established patient leaders and lay partners to develop their skills further so that they can support true community involvement in planning the delivery of health and social care going forward.
